Taming Your Tongue

Lesson 18

Memorize (Select One) -

- ✓ Psalm 19:14 Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O LORD, my rock and my Redeemer.
- ✓ Colossians 4:6 Let your speech always be with grace, as though seasoned with salt, so that you will know how you should respond to each person.

Your tongue is the tattletale on your heart. Its misuse is the easiest way to sin. What you are will inevitably be disclosed by what you say.

In the Bible, the tongue is described as wicked, deceitful, perverse, filthy, corrupt, flattering, slanderous, gossiping, blasphemous, foolish, boasting, complaining, cursed, contentious, sensual, and vile. And this list is not exhaustive!

In describing man's total depravity, the Scriptures declare, "Their throat is an open grave, with their tongue they keep deceiving, the poison of asps is under their lips; whose mouth is full of cursing and bitterness." (Romans 3:13 & 14).

Jesus set forth the seriousness of your speech when He said, "Every careless word that people speak, they shall give an accounting for it in the Day of Judgment. For by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned." (Matthew 12:36 & 37).

When a sinner receives Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, he becomes a new creation. His whole being is transformed and indwelt by the Holy Spirit. A transformed nature will involve a sanctified life that leads to sanctified speech. Taming your tongue is possible but not automatic. Sanctified speech requires your cooperation with the Holy Spirit as you discipline yourself in putting on the new man speech which is presented to you in the Scriptures.

IV. Communication Guidelines

Provided by Pastor Tim Keller:

- 1. Be a ready *listener* and do not answer until the other person has finished talking (Prov. 18:13; James 1:19).
- 2. Be *slow to speak*. Think first. Don't be hasty in your words. Speak in such a way that the other person can understand and accept what you say (Prov. 15:23, 28; 29:20; James 1:19).
- 3. Don't go to bed angry! Each day clear the offenses of that day. Speak the truth but do it in love. Do not exaggerate. (Eph. 4:15, 25; Col. 3:8; Matt. 6:34).

- 4. Do not use silence to frustrate the other person. Explain why you are hesitant to talk at this time (Prov. 10:19; 15:28; 16:21, 23; 18:2; 20:15; Col. 4:6).
- 5. Do not become involved in quarrels. It is possible to disagree without quarreling (Prov. 17:14; 20:3; Rom. 13:13; Eph. 4:31).
- 6. Do not respond in uncontrolled anger. Use a soft and kind response and tone of voice (Prov. 14:29; 15:1; 25:15; 29:11; Eph. 4:26, 31).
- 7. When you are in the wrong, admit it and ask for forgiveness and ask how you can change (Prov. 12:15; 16:2; 20:6; 21:2; Matt. 5:23-25; Luke 17:3; James 5:16).
- 8. When someone confesses to you, tell him you forgive him. Be sure it is forgiven and not brought up to the person, to others, or to yourself! (Prov. 17:9; Eph. 4:32; Col. 3:13; I Pet. 4:8).
- 9. Avoid nagging (Prov. 10:19; 16:21, 23; 17:9; 18:6, 7; 21:19; 27:15).
- 10. Do not blame or criticize the other person. Instead, restore.....encourage......edify (Rom. 14:13; Gal. 6:1; I Thess. 5:11).
- 11. If someone verbally attacks, criticizes, or blames you, do not respond in the same manner (Rom. 12:17, 21; I Pet. 2:23; 3:9).
- 12. *Try to understand the other person's opinion.* Make allowances for differences.
- 13. Be concerned about the other person's interests (Eph. 4:2; Phil. 2:4; 3:15, 16).

IV. Practical Application

Having read and worked through this important lesson, list two **specific** ways you will give effort toward sanctified speech.

Now, consider that person who knows you well and loves you enough to tell you the truth. Get alone with them and ask them to help you to grow by telling you how you may be more like Christ in the stewardship of your words. Ask them to be direct and specific. Be sure to thank them for their help!
